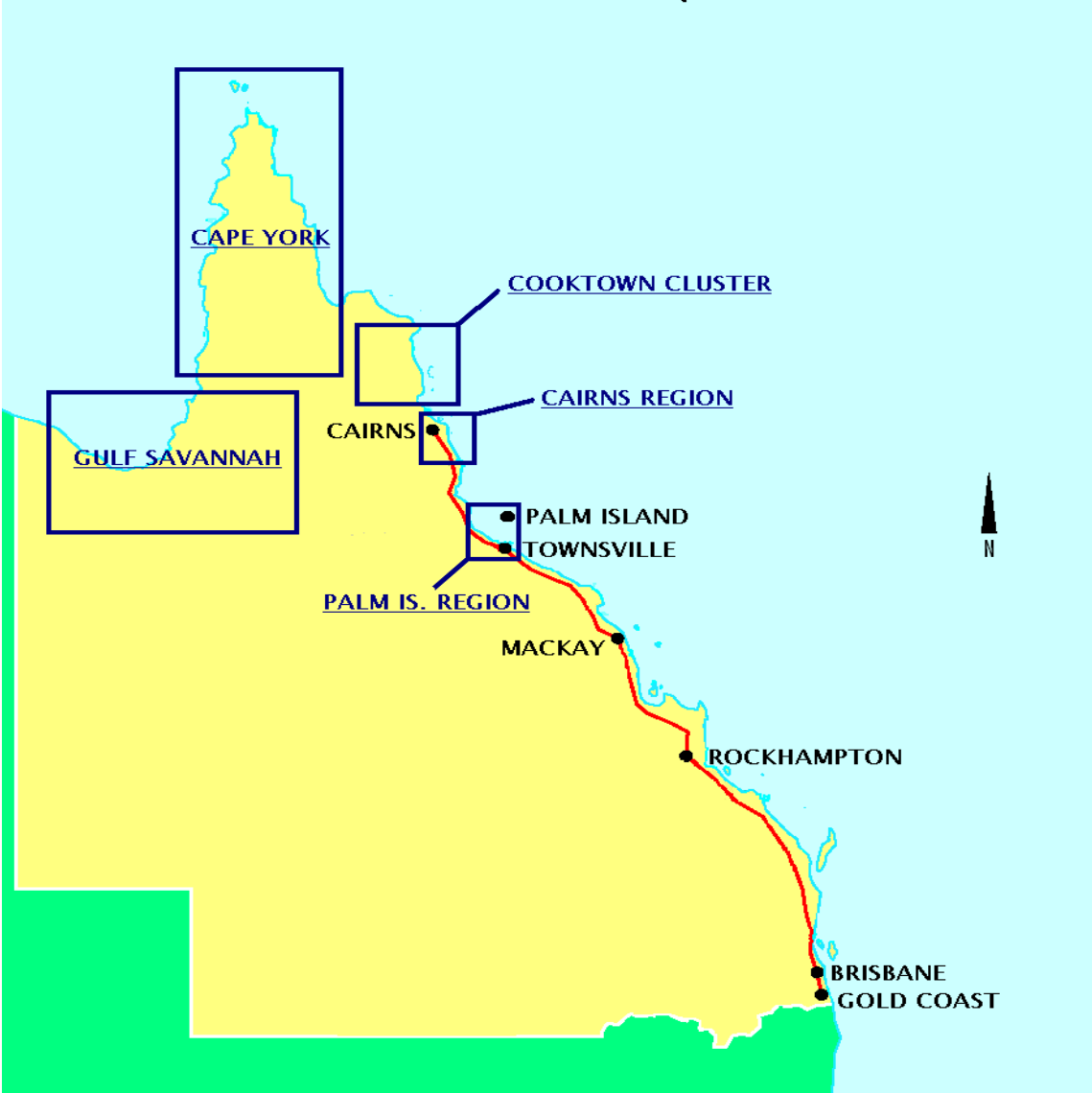
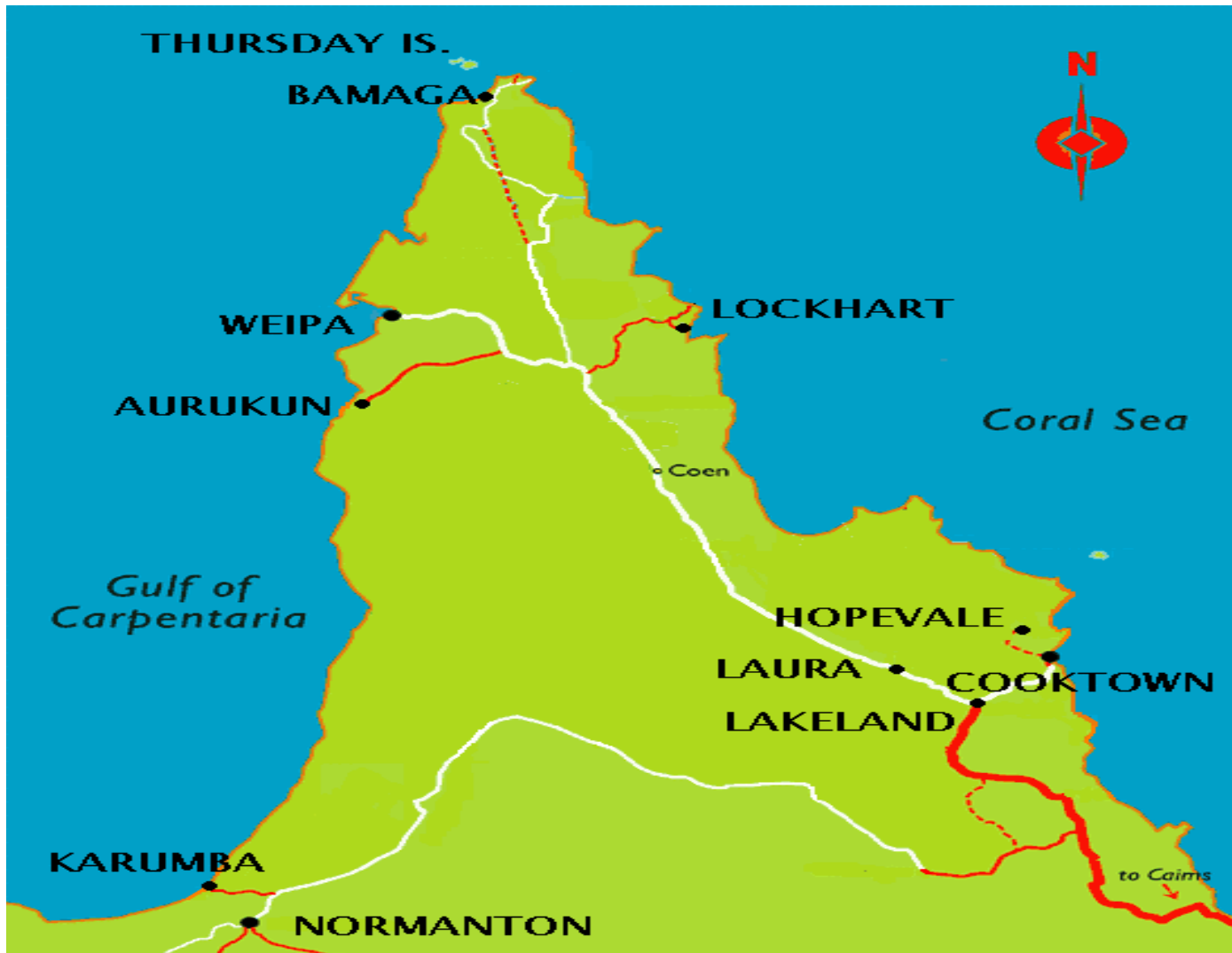

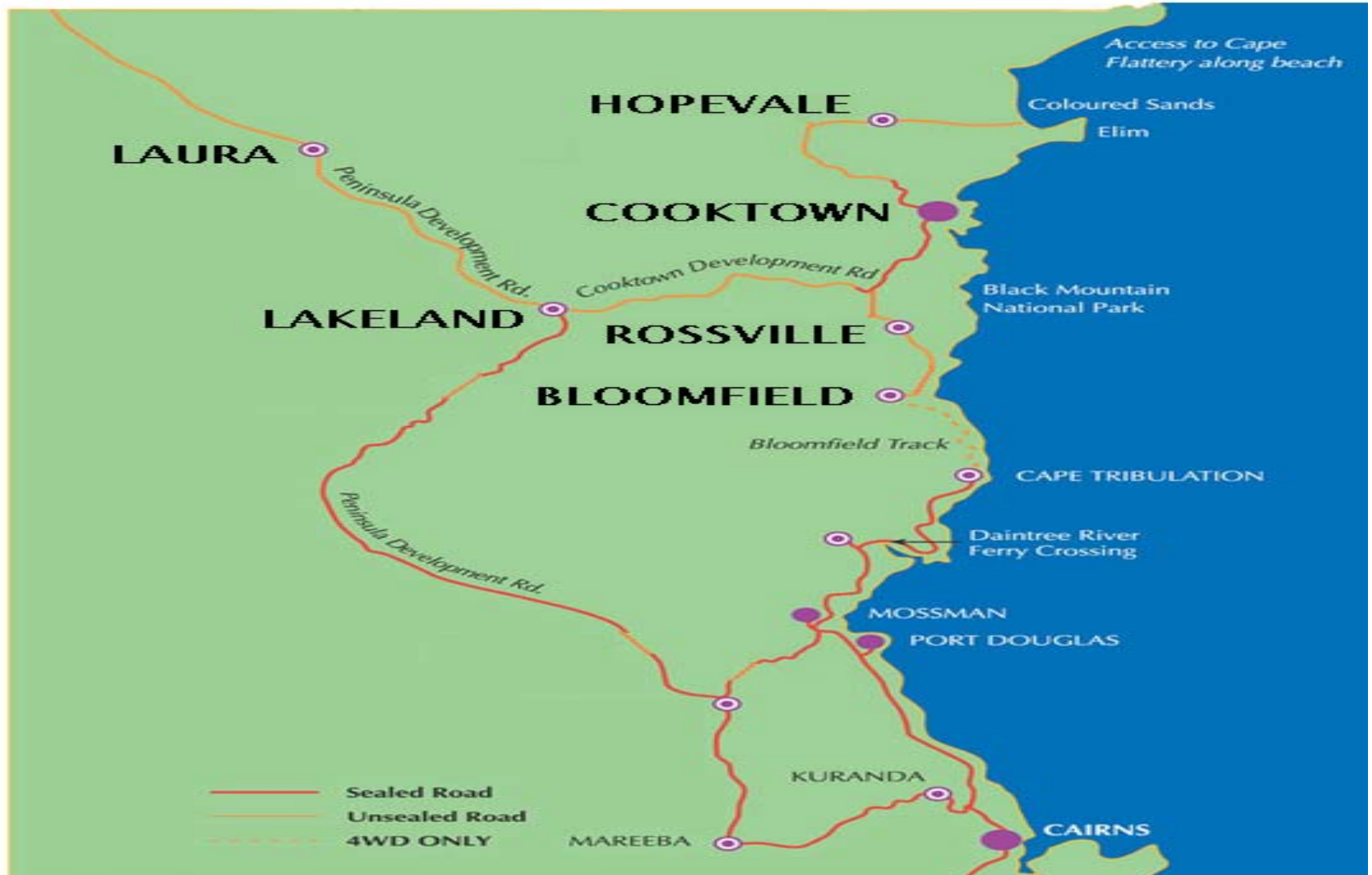
Map Outlines the Delivery Regions of the Remote Program



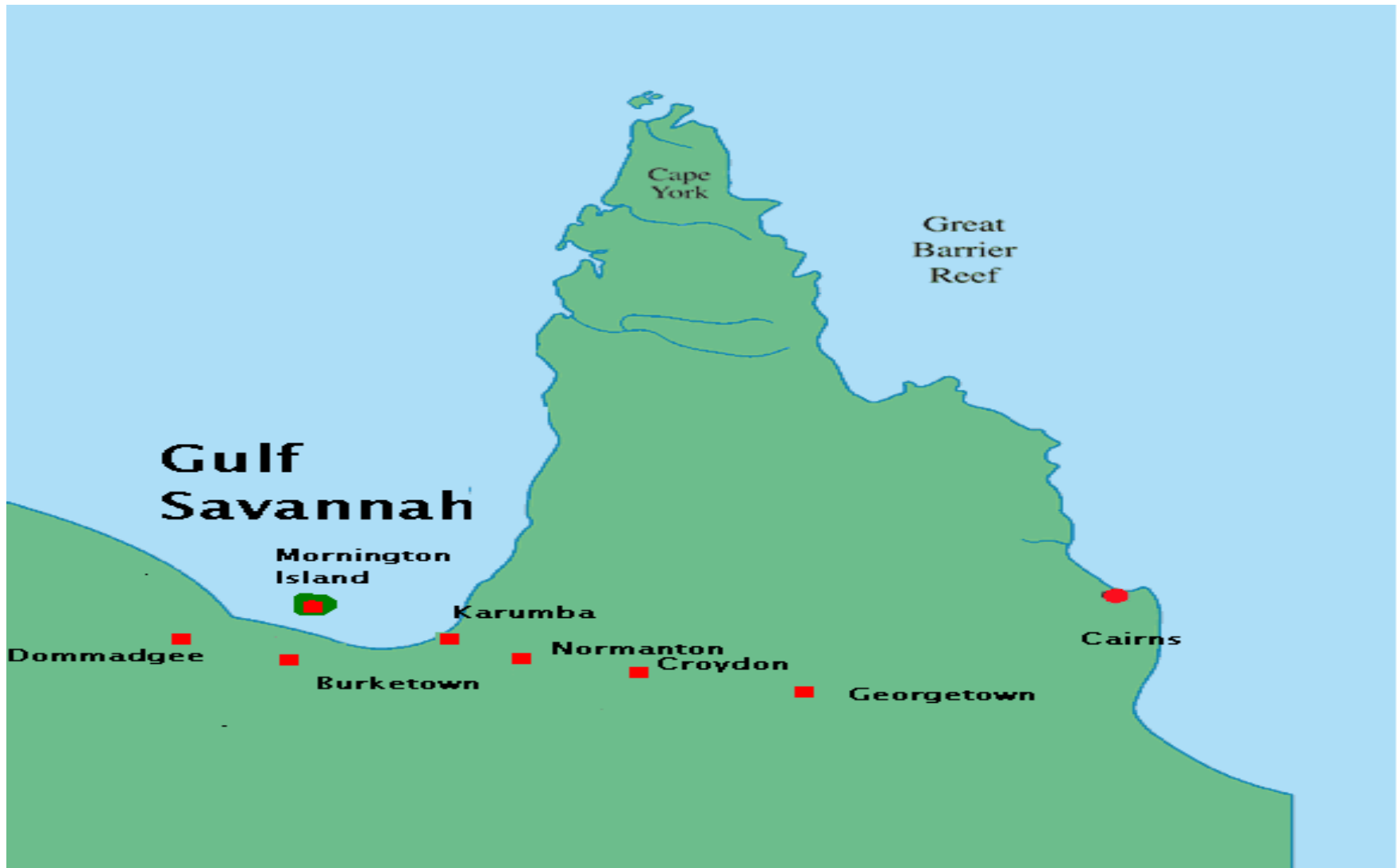
Map Outlines the Delivery Regions of the Remote Program

Community Partnerships

Gulf Sport and Recreation Assoc Inc

- Represents Schools and Sporting Org in the Gulf
- Gulf Hockey is unincorporated but affiliated with GSRA Inc and GSRA Inc is affiliated with HQ Inc
- GSRA Inc wants young people of the Gulf to have the opportunity to be involved and understand what it is to compete in the type of competitions we take for granted and be able to provide them with some kind of pathway to opportunities again that we take for granted.
- Presently the hockey program is providing this for the young people in particular the young girls.
- History with GSRA
- 2001 – we were invited to the Karumba Basketball Festival after being introduced to Mike Stevenson. We were working in Cairns in the Manoora area. We sat on the oval and waited to see if the Gulf children wanted to learn a new sport. We saw 120 children in 2 days.

- Pathways explores and first Under 13 girl was identified and invitation to Development Camp with higher quality coaches after attending Under 13 State Championships
- GSRA Inc began first local competition
- GSRA exploring moving to grass field hockey
- Local Councils getting behind the move
- More teams attend Karumba and played on grass for the first time.
- Discussions with HQ on how to develop continue

Cooktown Cluster Program

History

- Began in 2003 and unlike the Gulf it has no association of schools to look after the interests of the young people.
- There is little structured sport in the communities of this area for a number of reasons – facilities very poor and never known access to this type of opportunity.
- What our program tries to do is slowly educate the young people and the community parents and adults on the benefits of participating in an organized sporting activity.
- It is a slow process but when it is done the young people really like it as evidenced by the turn out at the Cooktown Cup both in 2003 and 2004.
- In 2005 the program is expanding to include coaching workshops.
- The small community of Wujul is playing hockey for the first time.

- In 2005 Cooktown Cluster will be part of the Cape/Gulf Challenge to be held in Oct/Nov.

DEVELOPMENT OFFICER COURSE

- In addition
- We will modify the following
- (a) SRFFIT013 A Provide information and exercise related to nutrition and body fat. We will substitute body fat for good health so the development officers in the communities can communicate to the young people and help them to understand about sport and good health and good eating going hand in hand.
- (b) New Units – Hockey Specific will be taken from the Sports Units and Hockey will be substituted from the existing sports.
- There will be the first level – basic but it can be expanded to intermediate in the future.
- Teach and develop the basic skills of hockey
- Teach and develop the basic strategies of hockey
- Interpret and apply the fundamental rules of hockey at a local or district level
- © We will also be introducing a new Unit that allows us to teach the student ‘How to get started’
- “Introduce Sport Session to new Community” - basic principle of how to introduce a new sport into a new area/community.
- (d) There will be a unit written on combining sport and culture as part of the program incorporating – indigenous games and hockey art.

DEVELOPMENT OFFICER COURSE

- In 2004 the Advisory Committee could not proceed to accreditation because of delays with the Department of Employment and Training reviewing the Training Packages which we need to take some of the Units from.
- These delays have put back accreditation about 8 months but it is unavoidable and SRQ have been kept fully informed and understand the reasons.
- The process of accreditation has begun again. Once we are advised by Department of Employment and Training of the Accreditation Certification Requirements in relation to these Units and the new Units we propose, we need to have the new Units written in a format acceptable to the Department..
- The whole process will take about 5-6 months so we believe that we will be ready for 2006. We have identified people to undertake the course and we need to discuss the course guidelines etc with Cairns Tafe in the interim.
- Nevertheless in 2005, a substantial amount of work will be done in relation to the course. Most of it will be outsourced in accordance with the funding application.
- In 2006 we will have a number of people undertaking the course and SRQ understand and agree with this course of action.

Identify and Recruit Women in prominent positions within remote/regional and indigenous communities to be involved in a mentor program for women in these remote and indigenous communities.

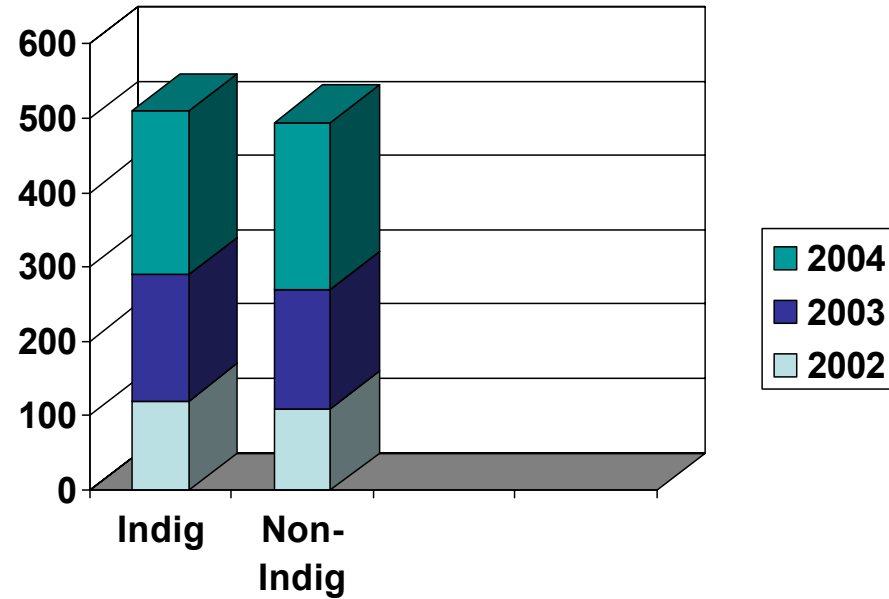
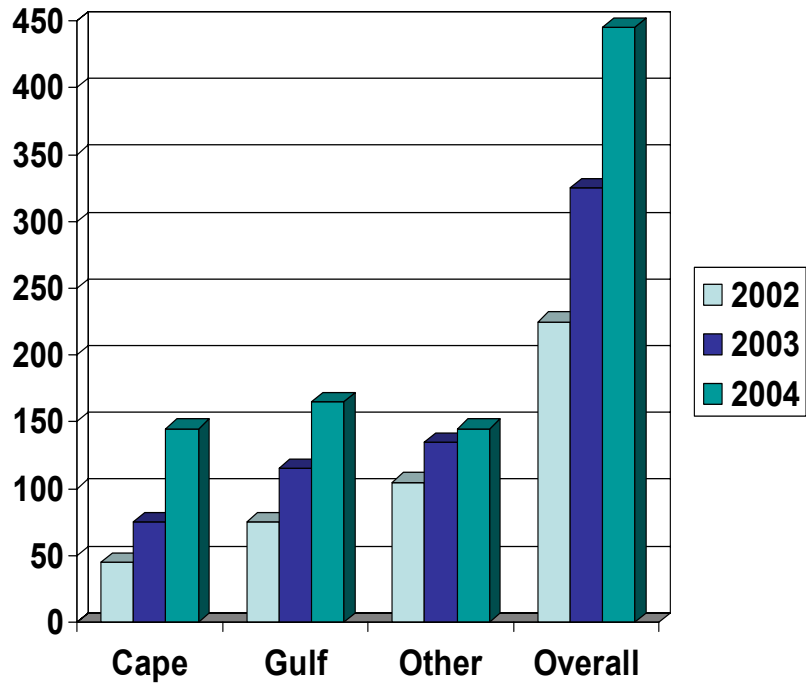
- To develop lines of communication, support networks, resources to enable the women in these communities to take a greater role in sustaining the participation programmes, competitions and initiatives.
- Once per year workshop to get women in remote and indigenous communities together with the Mentor Group and some support can be formulated for this workshop, it could be with another competition in the remote program calendar or something entirely different.
- It is hoped that the community will support this forum/workshop and encourage women to apply to be involved.

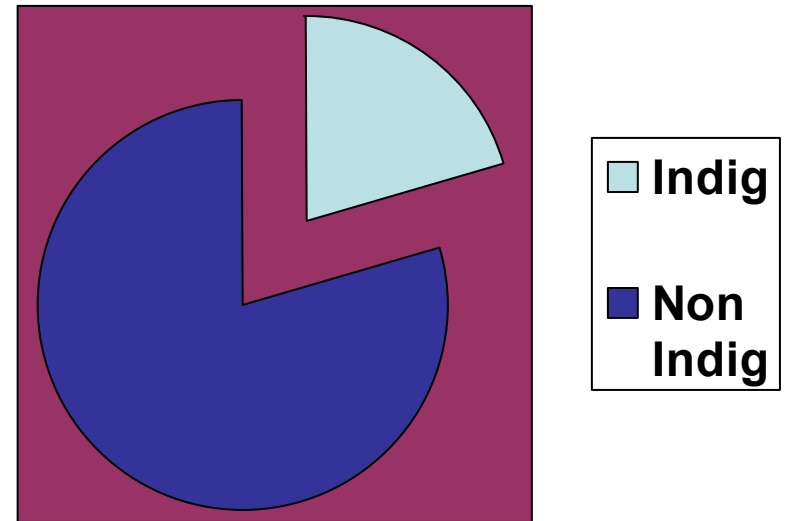
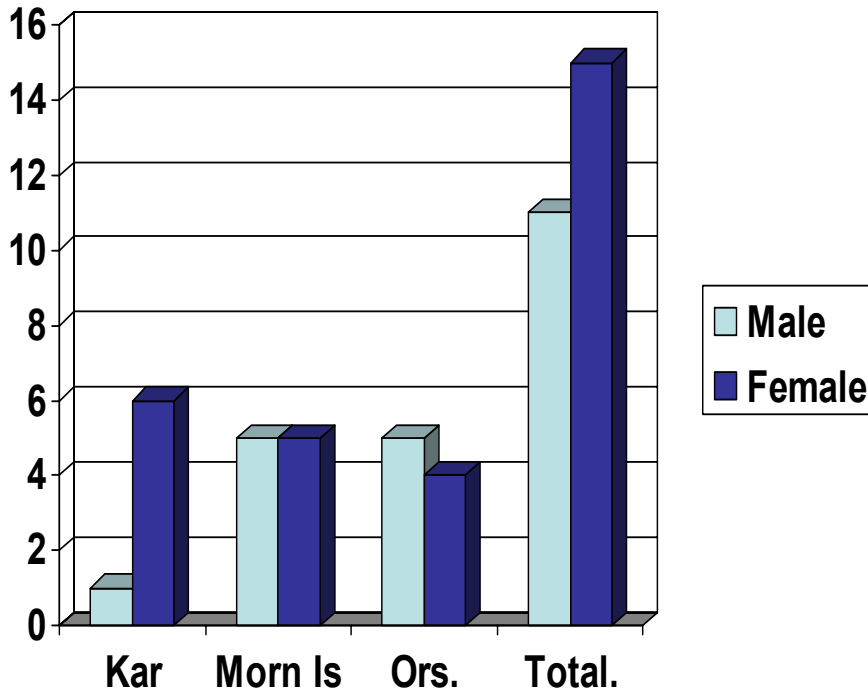
Remote and Indigenous Community Womens Network and Support Programme

- In 2005, detailed recruitment, planning, development and strategy planning is be done to ensure that the Mentoring Program will compliment and support the existing program.
- In 2006 we begin the practical application in the Cape/Gulf and Mount Isa Region and we begin the recruitment, planning and development and strategy planning for the Central Hiighlands.
- In 2007 the practical application in this area is established.
- By this conclusion of 2007, it is hoped that these strategies will be complimented by a number of Female Development Officers coming through with support from Tafe in some of these regional communities and expansion of the remote and indigenous program from North Queensland south.
- Women are integral to this and if the mentoring network is working and strong, the benefits will flow through medium to long term.
- We are just beginning this initiative with consultation on the membership of the Advisory Board and then the Development Planning in consultation with the remote communities.

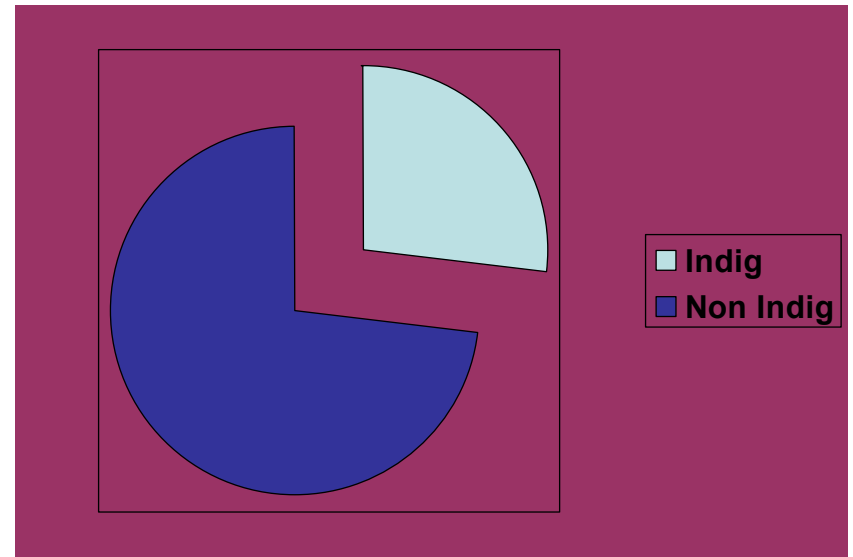
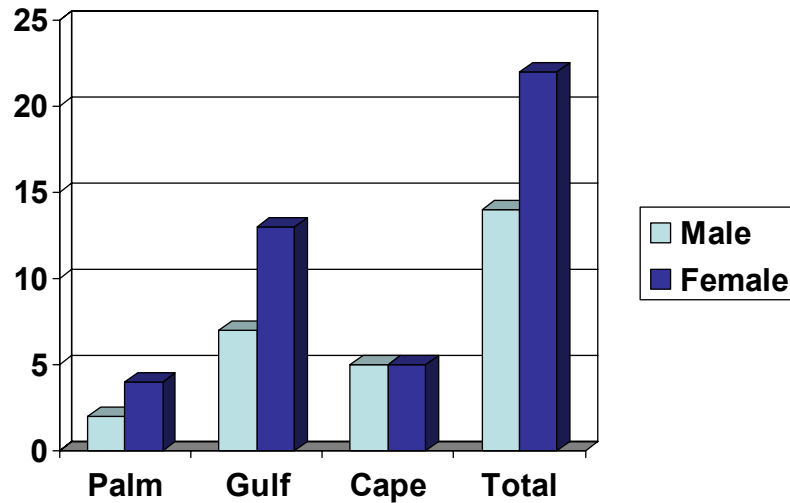
Remote Program – Participation Statistics

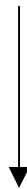

Current Position

- Continuing Development
- Original Sticks will always be available.
- We are also looking at a product range based on a design and included in that maybe a mass produced stick in stage 2
- We are going very slow and getting all the preliminary issues sorted in this area.
- No time limit is set and no obligations are placed on either party.
- Our financial responsibility is limited to trade marking the name Hockey Art.. That cost in under \$500.00 and Lynn and myself have been working closely in this regard.
- At no stage is there any obligation or responsibility in any relationship to be financially committed.
- This was always designed to be a potential way to raise revenue for the program without a serious financial commitment and all parties in this association are well aware of this.
- The artists have been kept informed of the process and when asked to undertake artwork have done so.
- We have spoken with the respected Lockhart Gang who are assisting us with Hockey Art clinics in that community and will come on board if necessary, although I do not anticipate this.
- I have no expectations in this regard, we are treating Just Hockey as one of our community partners and will employ all the operational and communication elements to this part of the program as any other.
- For your information as a community partner Just Hockey donated \$3000 worth of equip in 1994.
